Allendale Community League is looking for a contract (part-time, as needed) Handyperson for the maintenance and repair of community assets. This includes fixing sheds, benches, and fences; maintaining power equipment; trimming trees; mowing; weeding and basic grounds maintenance; snow removal; and other odd jobs as they arise. This position will assist in finding tradespeople for various jobs and will solicit quotes to present to the Board. They must have their own tools and be responsive to community needs.

The position will pay \$25.00 per hour for up to 15 hours per month (there may not be significant work every month so income is not guaranteed). Purchase of materials required for repair or maintenance will be reimbursed if accompanied by receipts. This position reports to the Operations Director. The League is always interested in new programing and event opportunities — we just need people to organize them. Do you have an idea and the willingness to get a program or event off the ground? Let us know!



Let's talk Bus Rapid Transit

One of the projects that did not receive much coverage following the December City Budget was the Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) system. BRT will provide an enormous connection and opportunity to reduce traffic and congestion, augment existing LRT and bus service, and provide reliable, faster and more frequent service.

Transit consultants and experts from across Canada have discussed how a connected BRT system can play a key role in achieving our climate and sustainability goals. Bus Rapid Transit costs a fraction of the billions we currently spend on roadways, but we will need partner support from both the Provincial and Federal government.

BEWARE OF BLACK KNOT

You can help to maximize the City's black knot pruning efforts by ensuring trees on private property are pruned for black knot between late fall to early spring. Black knot (Apiosporina morbosa) is a fungal disease that causes greenish brown to black swellings in the stems of plum and cherry trees (*Prunus spp.*). Black knot deforms branches and reduces the growth of trees. Heavily-infected trees often become stunted and may eventually die from the disease. The disease spreads during periods of warm, wet weather with the spores dispersed by splashing water, wind, birds, and insects.



Trees located on boulevards and in maintained parks susceptible to black knot are pruned by City arborists on a four-year pruning cycle. This allows for an annual focus on a specific quadrant of the city. This winter, the southwest quadrant will be the focus for black knot pruning on City trees. - Close all garage windows and lock any garage doors, especially those leading into your house.
- · Check and lock all house doors and shut all windows.
- Turn on an exterior light.
- Close and lock your fence gate.
- · Lock your shed.
- · Put away bikes and toys in your yard.

WHAT ARE SEASONAL ALLERGIES?

Seasonal allergies are a group of conditions that can cause sneezing, a stuffy or runny nose, and itchy eyes. Seasonal allergies are sometimes called "hay fever." Most seasonal allergies are caused by pollen from trees, grasses or weeds, or mould spores. Year-round allergic symptoms are caused by insects (dust mites, cockroaches), animals and mould spores.

The symptoms of seasonal allergies are: stuffy nose, runny nose, sneezing, Itchy red eyes, itchy sore throat or ears. People with seasonal allergies may use any of the following treatments to help reduce allergic symptoms:

- Saline nose rinses
- Steroid nose sprays best treatment for a stuffy nose
- Antihistamines to help stop itching, sneezing and runny nose symptoms
- Antihistamine eye drops help with eye symptoms
- Decongestants reduce stuffy nose symptoms
- Allergy shots help to reduce allergic symptoms

Most of these treatments are covered under insurance benefits. Some pharmacists can write prescriptions to give you the benefit of insurance and to reduce the wait time of a walk-in clinic or a family doctor. The right treatment for you depends on your symptoms and other health problems.

Symptoms can be prevented by starting preventative medicine a week or two before allergy season or by avoiding allergens.
